#### **2022 WATERSHED TALK NEWSLETTER UPDATE**

Today's issue of the WST contains the Fraser River Panel summary data below which includes important information to assist readers with better understanding the current fisheries management decisions made by the Fraser River Panel.

Fraser Panel Update August 26, 2022:

- Total Fraser sockeye accounted to date is 3.8 million and estimated 5.9 million.
- Total catch for Fraser sockeye fisheries is 908,838. In Canada nearly all catch comes from FSC fisheries with a total catch in Canada of 559,925. In US fisheries there is a split between Treaty Tribes Ceremonial and Subsistence (11,041), Treaty Tribal (231,724) and All Citizens (74,485) for a total of 317,250. Fraser panel test fisheries have caught 31,663 Fraser sockeye.
- Gulf troll test fishery is operational, with some preliminary information available today. The gulf troll test fishery is used to estimate late run abundance holding at the mouth of the Fraser.
- River temperature has increased to above 20c, some sign of heat stress in sockeye is being reported in the watershed. There is some potential for changes to the Management Adjustment (MA) to account for in-river mortality due to river conditions over the next couple weeks. The Panel didn't discuss changes to MAs today.
- The peak of Summer run sockeye has been observed, and in-season abundance estimates are getting more accurate. Currently, Summer run sockeye are coming in slightly below the p50 forecast of 4.4 million. Current Summer run size estimates are tracking close to last weeks adopted run size of 3.5 million.
- Current best estimate produced by the gulf troll test fishery for late run sockeye is 2.1 million. There is substantial uncertainty in the verification of this abundance, and PSC staff are working diligently to produce another set of gulf troll estimates next week. For now the PSC staff recommended 1.6 million Late run sockeye, until there is more confirmation of this abundance through the gulf troll test fishery program.
- Fraser Panel is proposing extension of the Area 20 purse seine test fishery, with the final decision next week.
- The Fraser Panel adopted an in-season run size of 1.6 million Late run sockeye.
- Last week the US proposed a suite of Treaty Tribal and All Citizens commercial fisheries based on preliminary Late run sockeye run size estimates. Canada unanimously disagreed and did not approve the proposed fisheries. Due to the Fraser Panel process, the US fisheries were approved. The catch in these

fisheries was much higher than expected and the US is unlikely to be implementing any more large fisheries this season unless a major abundance of Fraser sockeye is observed in the marine approach.
